



Introduction to the Liturgy of the Day

From five barley loaves and two fish, Jesus was able to provide a wonderful feast for thousands of people. All of them had plenty to eat and what was left over filled twelve wicker baskets. The people realized they had just witnessed a miracle, a sign to bring them to faith. We gather today for the Eucharistic feast, where we are invited to have our fill of the bread of eternal life. May the miracle we witness today bring us to a deeper belief in the Lord and his saving gift to us.



Reflection on the Gospel

Today's gospel might be read as a call to take extraordinary actions to relieve the hunger in our world. Efforts can begin with one courageous person willing to relinquish just a bit of their resources to others and to trust that in God's hands. there will be enough for all. Jesus reorients his disciples away from the inscrutable problem of scarcity and instead gives thanks for the abundance of God's provision. The resources to feed all, and for all to be satisfied, lie within the community.
